say contest, sponsored annually by the league in the high schools of the state. Winners in these districts contests will compete for state honors at the League's annual convention in Rocky Mount in May.

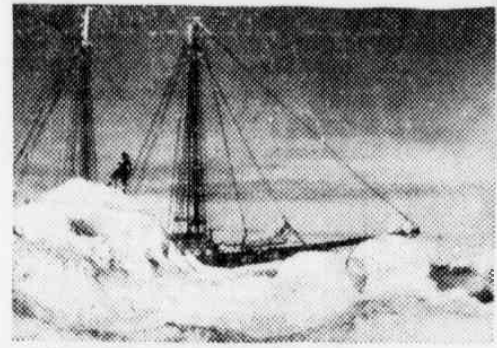
