**LIMITATIONS LAW HELD BAR IN USURY HEARING**

The two-year statute of limitations bars recovery in a usury case, Judge Clayton Moore, presiding at the Moore county term of Superior Court for trial of civil matters, ruled last week in non-suiting the action of Mrs. Millie W. Morris against the Sandhills Financing Corporation.

Mrs. Morris was seeking to recover \$7,000, double the alleged usurious interest she claimed she paid on a loan from the finance company. The court, however, did not go into the merits of the litigation after learning that two years had passed since the interest in question was paid.

The plaintiff gave notice of appeal to the Supreme Court.
