

**County Bar Adopts
L. B. Clegg Memorial**

Late Attorney "of Distinguished Lineage Written Large in History of Moore County"

A beautiful memorial on the life and character of Luther Bynum Clegg, written by E. J. Burns, W. D. Matthews and J. Talbot Johnson as a committee representing the Moore County Bar, was adopted in Superior Court last week and spread on the minutes.

"On the 20th day of February, 1936, at Moore County Hospital the Bar Association of Moore County suffered the loss of one of its most popular members in the death of L. B. Clegg when he died of a complication of diseases. He had been stricken on the previous Saturday evening as he was preparing for the night," the memorial begins.

"Luther, as he was affectionately known by his fellow members of the County Bar, was of distinguished lineage and the names of his forbears are written large in the history of Moore County . . .

"The deceased was not only born in this county but spent practically his entire life here, contributing his efforts to the best interests of Carthage, Moore county and the State of North Carolina," the writing says in part.

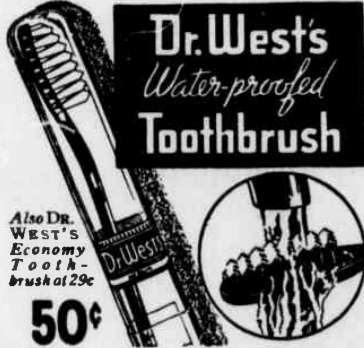

Mrs. Hewitt Awarded \$7,000 For Death of Son in Auto Accident

Many Cases Settled in February Term of Superior Court at Carthage

Mrs. Elizabeth Hewitt of Southern Pines was last week in Superior Court awarded judgment against R. G. Morrison and Thomas Morrison, III, in the sum of \$7,000 in a compromise settlement of a case growing out of the death of her young son, John Vernon Hewitt. Hewitt, a popular youth of Southern Pines, was instantly killed on a street in Southern Pines when the bicycle upon which he was riding was struck by a motor vehicle driven by Thomas Morrison, III. The defendants were to pay the costs of the action.

It was ordered that Bertha Sanders recover of the Maryland Casualty Company the sum of \$749, this being the balance due her husband on a judgment of \$1,050 awarded him by the North Carolina Industrial Commission for injuries received as an employee of the Standard Mining Company of this county.

The plaintiff alleged that she and her children had been deserted by the husband, John L. Sanders, and that prior to the time when he abandoned them he had signed a paper asking that the weekly installment of \$7 paid from this fund be turned over to her.

The court having entered a final decree adjudging the liquidation and winding up of the affairs of the Page Corporation, it was ordered that the corporation be dissolved.

Other cases were: J. Pleasant Hines versus A. Montesanti; compromised.

Harvey B. Jones, W. A. Jones and others versus Kenneth A. Jones, Anderson McPherson and others: Harvey B. Jones appointed permanent receiver.

Pinehurst, Inc., versus A. L. Boykin and son, Trustees of Spauldings Chapel, and others: It appearing that similar actions are pending for trial, growing out of the same controversy, all involving question of liens and contracts for materials furnished and work done in connection with the construction of the church, and it appearing that it would be expedient if all cases were calendared for trial at the same term, it was ordered that such cases be peremptorily set as first cases for trial on Monday of next term of civil court.

C. W. Burke and others versus North Carolina Coal Mining Corporation: receivers having failed to file a final account, it was ordered that they forthwith sell all personal property of defendant for paying necessary court costs and expense of operating the receivership and make a full report at May term.

Sears, Roebuck & Company versus J. L. McGraw: mistrial.

Millie W. Morris versus Sandhill Financing Corporation: judgment of non-suit; plaintiff gives notice of appeal.

E. G. Goins versus G. B. Watkins and R. C. Watkins: plaintiff to recover nothing and to be taxed with costs. Notice of appeal given.

Gurney P. Hood, Commissioner of Banks, Ex Rel Page Trust Company, and others versus R. G. Wallace and others: defendants having neglected to perfect their appeal to the Superior Court, appeal dismissed and former judgment affirmed.

March Weather

In and Out Like a Lamb, but Plenty of Lion Mixed in Between

March came in and went out quite lamblike, but in between times raged like the proverbial lion giving diversified samples of thunder and lightning, with a few flakes of snow on the 10th, and 18th, just enough to assure us that they were not bursting cotton bolls, and 9.35 inches of rain, five and one-half inches above the normal expectation. Low temperature for the month was 30 degrees on the 18th, highest 85 on the last day of the month. Spring entered with overcast skies, a little rain, and a maximum temperature of 59.

Our heaviest rainfall came on the 17th, with 1.32 inches, the total of 9.35 inches for the month being 4.80 inches more than last March, and 5.49 inches above the long time normal. These continued heavy rains for the first three months of the year now total 21.44 inches, 10.13 inches over the long time average.
