Was Charter Member of Eureka Presbyterian Church and Head of Church Societies

Mrs. Mary Blue, of Eureka Community, died at her home Monday, April 20th, after an illness of nearly three weeks. Burial was in Old Bethesda Cemetery at 3 p. m. on April 21st. The funeral was from the old church, the Rev. W. S. Golden, her pastor, officiating, being assisted by the Rev. E. L. Barber of Aberdeen and Dr. Marcus A. Brownson of Southern Pines.

Mrs. Mary McCrummen Blue was born October 30th, 1856, the daughter of the late John McCrummen and Regina Buie McCrummen. Her passing was at the time of year she loved most, the time that is symbolic of her going-waking time; a new life. From her early girlhood she was a leader, taking active part in anything that advanced her Master's Kingdom.

Assuming the duties of wife and mother in early womanhood, this lovely Christian woman continued her life of broader usefulness to her church and community. In answer to her prayers and in response to her efforts, a weekly Sabbath school was begun in the community, she being instrumental in the change from twice a month to each Sabbath sessions.

Having lost her husband, the late P. A. Blue, in 1904, while she was a comparatively young woman with small children, Mrs. Blue did not lose sight of her love and interest to others. She was ever busy ministering to the sick in the community and giving comfort in various ways to those whom she saw in distress and trouble.
