

John Kennedy Walker 81 at Time of Death Of Family of Early Scotch Settlers, He Came to Southern Pines 19 Years Ago

John Kennedy Walker aged 81 years, died in his home on Ashe street, Southern Pines, last Thursday night, April 30th. Apparently in good health during the early part of the evening he aroused Mrs. Walker with a request for something to relieve a seemingly slight distress, and expired within a few moments. Funeral services, conducted by the Rev. C. Rexford Raymond, pastor of the Church of Wide Fellowship, were held in his late home at 4:00 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Interment in the family plot at Deerfield, N. Y., followed services there on Monday afternoon.

Mr. Walker the son of Peter Walker and Mary (Blue) Walker, was born in Deerfield, December 25th, 1855, and following retirement from his business of surveying, came with Mrs. Walker to Southern Pines 19 years ago. Here their years of residence and quiet life endeared them to a large circle of friends.

Mr. Walker's mother, Mary Blue, was a direct descendant of that family of Blue's coming from Knapdale, Scotland and settling at an early date in the past century near Utica, N. Y., a family that has numerous members descended from other ancestors settling in the Sandhills at the same period, and with whom Mr. Walker is a distant kinsman.

18,000 NEW CARS SOLD IN STATE SINCE JAN. 1

North Carolinians bought 4,931 new automobiles and 1,439 new trucks during April, the Motor Vehicle Bureau reports.

In March there were 3,426 new cars and 1,120 new trucks sold in the state, and in April 1935 there were 6,394 new cars and 1,591 trucks.

In four months this year there were 13,509 new cars and 4,475 new trucks sold.
