33d Annual Meeting of Association of Which Dr. Bush Is President

Three Arrested for Two Store Burglaries

Held for Superior Court for Theft of Goods in Jackson Spgs. and Eagle Springs

Paul Cuffie, Goldie Cuffie and Ben George Harrington, colored of West End, were in Recorder's Court on Monday to face charges of breaking and entering and larceny in two different cases. Probable cause was found and in each case they were bound to Superior Court under bond of \$500 each.

In the first, they were charged with breaking and entering C. C. Underwood's store in Eagle Springs and stealing twenty pairs of shoes, several bolts of cloth, clothing and cigarettes. The store of W. D. Thomas in Jackson Springs was the other place the trio was alleged to have visited, and clothing and tobacco were missing from this store. The goods stolen from the Eagle Springs store were valued at from \$250 to \$300. Officers offered a reward of \$50 and this led to the arrest of the three on Thursday night of last week as they were attempting to sell what is said to have been the stolen goods at a building between Pinehurst and Aberdeen.

Estelle Bogan, colored of Southern Pines, charged with breaking and entering the home of John Boggan and taking therefrom one shot gun, was bound to Superior court under bond of \$300. Estelle, in a second case, pleaded guilty to the larceny of four chickens from Ed Dowdy and was sent to jail for 30 days.

For slashing Jim Kimball with a knife, Leonard Hart, white of near Vass, was given a three months' road sentence, to be suspended upon payment of the costs and doctor bill and upon condition of good behavior for two years.

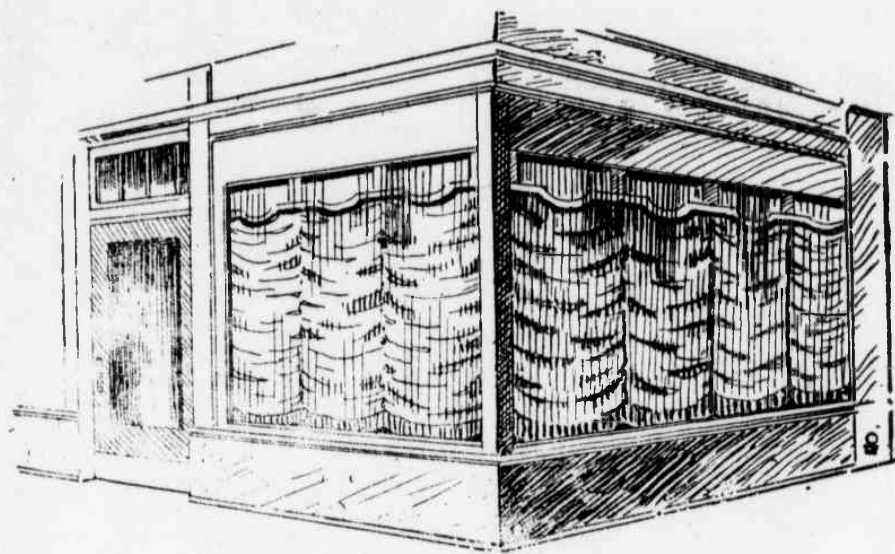
Publicity Avoided
"Apparently the committee is being criticized for the situation of the intended addition and for failure to take the public into its confidence in advance of its contemplated move. But everyone knows that publicity and general discussion frequently renders the acquisition of public property difficult or impossible and usually prolongs negotiations interminably. The new property is located in a good, quiet neighborhood, is more convenient than the present site to a majority of the young children in the district, and after alteration it is believed will afford freedom, good light and ventilation and generally satisfactory physical conditions. However it is open to anyone who does not agree to initiate a campaign for a new school, which must be built sooner or later anyhow but which will at best involve a big increase in the school tax rate. Rightly on Monday the school committee decided that the present is not an opportune time for the proposal of any such ambitious program and the resolution to establish a temporary annex was dictated mainly by considerations of economy."
