do everything within our power to get more liberal appropriations for better drivers and safer buses from the State and county, as we have consistently done in the past. I have tried for years to get the State to furnish capable men drivers for our buses, but always have been ordered to employ only boys at 42 1-2 cents per day. The State School Commission in Raleigh purchases the buses, fixes the routings and salaries of all drivers through special agents sent out from Raleigh. All these matters are quite beyond the control of the county and district school officials. We look forward to the time when local self government shall be restored to the counties and transportation of school children made safe.

"There have been three deaths from school bus accidents in Moore county in its history," said Mr. Thomas. "One occurred near Hemp in 1931, and the other two resulting from the accident near Calvary last Tuesday, May 5th. The driver in the first accident was 38 years of age, and was considered one of the most capable drivers in the county at that time.

During the present school year 60 buses have transported 3,200 children an average of 33 miles to and from school each day in Moore county. These buses travel 1,980 miles daily and 316,800 miles in the entire school year. During the past five years buses in Moore county have travelled approximately 1,000,000 miles," he stated.
