

Diplomas Awarded 19 Seniors At the Vass-Lakeview School

Dr. Bedinger of Flora Macdonald College Speaker at Graduation Exercises

The Vass-Lakeview High School held its commencement exercises this week, bringing to a close a successful year's work under the leadership of A. M. Calhoun, principal. Diplomas were awarded 19 high school graduates, and 25 seventh grade pupils were promoted to the high school.

On Sunday evening the baccalaureate sermon was preached by the Rev. D. E. Earnhardt, presiding elder of the Fayetteville district of Methodist churches. His subject was "Christ, the Great Physician." The Scripture lesson was read by the Rev. C. I. Calcutt, Presbyterian minister of Vass, and the music was under the direction of Mrs. W. E. Gladstone.

On Monday evening the good ship "Vass-Lakeview" sailed into port and those aboard delighted their audience with a clever program. Herbert Cameron introduced the members of the Senior class; Edna Earle Richardson gave the class history; Barney Kirk read the will, and Grace Goodman and Marshall McRae presented the gifts. There were songs by the entire group and a selection by Pauline Crissman, Edna Earle Richardson, Gladys Cox and Alma Crouse.

Graduating exercises were held at 10:00 o'clock Tuesday morning with Dr. Henry G. Bedinger, president of Flora Macdonald College, as the speaker. Dr. Bedinger stressed the value of education and urged the younger boys and girls to continue their studies until they, too, had finished the high school course.

H. Lee Thomas, county superintendent, spoke especially to the seventh grade graduates on "The Four Cardinal Principles of Christian Education," bringing out the four-fold growth of Christ as contrasted to the life of Methuselah, about whom nothing could be said except that he lived 969 years. Mr. Calhoun announced the winners of two prizes given by the Vass Woman's Club to the students in the English department who had shown the greatest improvement during the year. They were Julian Smith and Hackney Marks. Margaret Bailey was awarded the scholarship medal. Mr. Calhoun announced that a plaque was to be placed in the hall and that each year the name of the best all around pupil in the Senior class would be engraved on it. The name of Edna Earle Richardson of the present class will be the first to be engraved, he announced. Miss Richardson made the highest average of any member of her class and has been a leader in athletics, music and other activities.

Mr. Calhoun presented diplomas to the 19 graduates, who were the first in the local school to appear in caps and gowns for their graduation. Miss Eunice Setzer was the director. Janet Rosser entertained with a tap dance and a violin solo between acts.
