(B) "Bangs DISEASE - CONTA-GIOUS ABORTION. A three tube dilution serological blood test of all herds and additions thereto shall be made before any milk therefrom is sold, and as often thereafter as the health officer may direct. A certificate identifying each animal and signed by a licensed veterinatian and filed with the health department shall
