ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

At a regular meeting of the Mayor and Board of Town Commissioners of the Town of Southern Pines, at the 1936, the Board unanimously adopted City Hall, held on the 20th day of May the following amendment to the Standard Milk Ordinance which was adopted by the Board of Town Commissioners on February 3rd, 1926, this amendment to be inserted in the said Ordinance at the bottom of page 18 and at the end of Sub-section ONE, Section 7, of said ordinance, immediately after the following: "Herds showing reactors on any test shall be retested within six months, but not before the lapse of sixty days."
(B) "BANGS DISEASE—CONTAGIOUS ABORTION. A three tube dilution serological blood test of all herds and additions thereto shall be made before any milk therefrom is sold, and as often thereafter as the health officer may direct. A certificate identifying each animal and signed by a licensed veterinarian and filed with the health department shall be evidence of the above test.
