Escaped Convicts Caught When Bloodhounds Lead to Hide-Out

Three of Quartet Which Fleed Prison Camp Near Carthage Captured at Vass

After a man-hunt which lasted several hours, Archie Shaveright, L. N. Haney and Manly Hammons, prisoners who escaped from the prison camp near Carthage, were captured about midnight Friday just three miles from Vass near the Vass-Carthage road. They were directly in front of the home of W. T. Cox and were hiding in the bushes only a few yards from the road. A fourth prisoner, Ulus Brewer, who separated from the other three shortly after leaving the camp, has not been found.

The prisoners staged their break about 4:00 o'clock Friday afternoon after overpowering a hospital steward, stealing \$28 from him and taking a rifle and shotgun from the camp's office.

The break occurred at the camp's infirmary where three of the men were confined after complaining of

illness and where the fourth was scubbing floors. A steward, J. N. Green, entered the room and was quickly overpowered by the four prisoners, who locked him up in the room after taking all of his keys.

They then entered the camp's office with the steward's keys and stole a rifle, shotgun and ammunition. Before fleeing they disconnected the telephone line. When the break was discovered, guards had to walk more than a mile to Carthage to notify county officers.

A posse of fifty or sixty men was soon assembled and bloodhounds were brought in from three places. Officers feared that the prisoners would stage a hold-up and get a car in which to flee the county, and to prevent this men in ten or fifteen cars patrolled the various roads, keeping a sharp look-out and warning motorists of the impending danger. They worked on the supposition that if the prisoners could be kept on foot, the bloodhounds would find them, and their faith was not misplaced for never in the history of the county have dogs done a finer piece of trailing.

Local officers were joined by Oscar Pitts and John Bray of the State Penal division who assisted in directing the hunt, and within about eight hours after the break all but one of the men were back in custody without their having had an opportunity of committing an additional crime to add to their record. They offered no resistance when caught.

Shaveright was serving a term of 18-20 years; Haney, two to five years and Hammons, 18-30 months. Brewer's sentence was from three to five years. The prisoners, all of whom are white men, were taken to Raleigh.
