

TOBACCO MARKET TO OPEN HERE ON SEPTEMBER 22D

Dates Are Announced For Various Belts at Annual Meeting of U. S. Association

FULL SET OF BUYERS

The Middle Belt tobacco market, in which Aberdeen and Carthage are located, opens this year on September 22d. Dates for the various belt openings were set at a meeting of the Tobacco Association of the United States held at Hot Springs, Va. last Friday. E. J. O'Brien of Louisville, Ky. was elected president.

Markets will open as follows: Georgia Belt, August 4; South Carolina Belt, August 13; East Carolina Belt, September 1; Middle Belt, September 22; Old Belt, October 5, and Dark-Fired Belt, November 17.

In his annual report W. T. Clark of Wilson, retiring president, said that "while the export tobacco trade was suffering temporarily it was obvious that tobacco grown in the United States would maintain its position in world trade because of consumer taste". High prices and efforts of governments to become independent of other nations largely accounted for tobacco exports dropping lower than any year since 1915 during 1935, he said.

The association deferred action on a request of J. S. McFadyen and A. E. Dixon, representing Fayetteville, for the establishment of a market there. Both Aberdeen and Carthage will have a full set of buyers this season, it was stated at the meeting.

County Schools To Open September 7

Rental System For Text Books Planned; Teachers Elected and Approved

Moore county schools will open for the fall term on Monday, September 7, according to information given out by County Superintendent H. Lee Thomas.

School books will be obtained under "Plan B" of the school book rental system, which provides all of the basal books that are now in adoption in the state with three supplementary readers for each grade. These books will be distributed in sets that are large enough to care for the average section of reading group, probably about 40 copies for the upper grades and 20 to 30 (depending upon the size of the reading group) for the lower grades. A minimum of 36 dictionaries for each school is included. This number will be increased at each school depending upon the size of the school.

Under this plan the rental fee will range from about \$1.10 for the first and second grades to \$2.70 for the high school.

Practically all of the teachers for the various schools have been elected and approved by the county board, there being only a very few vacancies remaining in the county.

MAN FATALLY HURT IN AUTO CRASH AT SAMARCORD
