Clark of Wilson, retiring president, said that "while the export tobacco trade was suffering temporarily it was obvious that tobacco grown in the United States would maintain its position in world trade because of consumer taste". High prices and efforts of governments to become independent of other nations largely accounted for tobacco exports dropping lower than said.

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
