

To Give Red Cross Course in First Aid

Classes To Be Held at Night For Persons 17 Years of Age or Older

A standard American Red Cross course in First Aid will be conducted in Southern Pines under the direction of the Moore County Chapter American Red Cross.

This course requires a minimum of fifteen hours for completion. It combines the lecture and discussion method, with regular review covering each lesson. The course also includes a demonstration and explanation of First Aid methods, followed by actual practice by each student.

The class manual used is the Red Cross First Aid Text Book. Each student is required to have one. The price of this book is sixty cents and is the only expense to the student.

Those eligible for enrollment are students who have completed the second year high school work or have reached their seventeenth birthday.

Classes will be held at night only and all those interested in taking the course are urged to get in touch with A. L. Adams or L. L. Woolley immediately and make arrangements for enrollment, as classes will be started within the coming week.
