

**WILSON COUNTY ABC BOARD EFFECTS CHANGES**

For the second time in a week, the Wilson County ABC Board, which operates the Pinehurst and Southern Pines stores, effected an important change in its organization by abolishing the post of supervisor of stores and substituting an inspector.

O. A. Glover, who has been supervisor of the stores for the last year, resigned to make way for the newly created post.

B. J. Williams, chairman of the Wilson board, explained that operation of the stores had become so smooth that a supervisor is needed no longer.

"You can't drop a bottle and break it in any one of the stores in the county," he said, "without the office here knowing about it a few hours later."

C. M. Gold, formerly manager of the Wilson ABC store, was appointed inspector. His job will be to check up on each store in the county every day and make a detailed report to the ABC office and the board.

The ABC board made the first change in its organization about a week ago when it turned over complete authority to enforce the liquor law in Wilson county to the sheriff and chief of police, abolishing the post of special ABC investigator.

**RECOMMENDS LARGE SUM TO ADVERTISE NORTH CAROLINA**

Bruce Etheridge, director of the North Carolina Board of Conservation and Development, recommended an appropriation of from \$50,000 to \$100,000 to advertise North Carolina to attract tourists and new industries. The recommendation, made to the board in his annual report this week, asked that the board ask the 1937 Legislature for the money.

At the close of the opening week of play in the Sandhills League, West End had assumed possession of the top perch by slugging out victories over Hemp and Southern Pines.

The West Enders humbled Southern Pines on Wednesday by a 13-2 count, as they rapped Ketchum and Parker for a total of 17 hits, but they gained most of their runs by virtue of Southern Pines errors. Coy Thomas was invincible for the winners and was touched for only three hits during his seven innings on the mound. A small crowd was on hand.

The Army No. 5 CCC outfit trounced Southern Pines in much the same manner last Sunday afternoon as errors and timely hits enabled them to score 13 runs as against 5 for the visitors. Southern Pines went into the sixth inning on the top end of a 4-3 score, but then proceeded to go to pieces afield and hand the army boys six runs and the ball game. A terrific home run by Weltons, CCC shortstop, featured the sixth inning uprising.

West End opened the league season on Saturday afternoon by spanking the Hemp outfit by an 8-1 count as Coy Thomah pitched masterful ball and was far ahead of the visitors all the way. A home run by Hirim McInnis was the batting feature of the game.
