### 129 AIRPLANES AND 119 PILOTS IN NORTH CAROLINA

North Carolina has 129 registered aircraft and 119 pilots, according to figures released this week by the Bureau of Air Commerce.

Of the aircraft 79 are licensed by the bureau and 50 are unlicensed. All are powered planes, none gliders, and the state has no glider pilots, the tabulation shows.

Of the pilots 71 hold transport licenses, the highest rating given; 41 have private licenses and seven have amateur licenses.

The figures also show that the Tar Heel State has 30 registered airports, in all eight of which are partly or fully lighted. Thirteen of these 30 are municipal ports, five commercial, three intermediate, eight auxiliary and one army port. South Carolina has 50 aircraft, 53 pilots and 29 landing fields, eight of which are lighted.

## Tracts and Terracer Ordered For County

### Will Be Leased Out to Farmers For Soil Conservation Work at Fair Rental

The Moore County Soil Conservation Committee has closed a deal with the Carolina Tractor and Equipment of Salisbury for a Diesel 45-horsepower caterpillar tractor and a terracer for use in the county. Delivery is expected soon, opening the way for farmers to increase their payments under the Soil Conservation program. This piece of work would be considered a soil building practice and will count. County Agent E. H. Garrison Jr. states, The rate of pay will be around \$1.50 per acre.

This equipment is not tied up with the Soil Conservation Program in the county. The cost of operation in the county will be set at \$3.00 per hour on the equipment. On an acre basis this will run from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per acre. Those having this work done will be required to pay for this when the work is completed. This may then be added to their applications when these are made out so that they will get at least a part of their money back this fall.

"This is about the fairest proposition I have seen", says Garrison, "and I see no reason why a great many people should not take advantage of it. Right now we have about 1,000 acres signed up to be terraced. Before we start out we expect to have around 2,000. This amount of acreage will keep the machine in operation for a long time. If you want yours terraced let us know."

The terraces to be erected by this outfit will be of the Mangum type. These will be around 18 ft. at the base with a height of around 30 inches. This will give a broad slope which carries an immense amount of water, still is not high but that machinery may be run over it without tearing it up.

### ARMSTRONG OF TROY TO SUCCEED JUDGE OGLESBY

Governor Ehringhaus this week named Frank M. Armstrong of Troy Superior Court judge of the 15th judicial, to succeed the late Judge John M. Oglesby.

The new jurist, who was prosecuting attorney of the Recorder's Court at Troy from 1928 through 1932, has also been chairman of the Montgomery County Democratic executive committee for a number of years. He is not married.

A graduate of the University of North Carolina Law School, he is 38 years of age and was born and reared in Montgomery county. His father is Charles A. Armstrong.

The governor was given the name of Armstrong and that of Solicitor Charles L. Coggin of Salisbury by the Fifteenth judicial committee as the two best qualified for the place. Armstrong was named as the first choice of the committeemen, however.
