The Moore County Soil Conservation Committee has closed a deal with the Carolina Tractor and Equipment of Salisbury for a Diesel 45horsepower caterpillar tractor and a terracer for use in the county. This piece of work would be considered a soil building practice and will count, County Agent E. H. Garrison Jr. states. The rate of pay will be around \$1.50 per acre.

On an acre basis this will run from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per acre. Those having this work done will be required to pay for this when the work is completed.
