

Reveals Julian Bishop's Trust Fund Income

Probate Court Reports on Sums Paid Carthage Landowner Who Plans "Walk"

Julian T. Bishop, New York broker, who has announced that he will move to Canada if President Roosevelt is re-elected, receives an annual income from a trust fund provided by his grandfather, William D. Bishop, president of the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railrad, a staunch Democrat, who left an estate of \$2,165,934, officers of Probate Court in Bridgeport, Conn., disclosed last week.

The grandson, according to the Probate Court records, received \$11,-451 in February, 1936; \$10,047 in 1934 \$11,460 in 1933 and \$11,166 in 1931.
