#### State Department Gets Under Way with Purchases Aug. 12th at Carthage

The County Board of Education is cooperating with the State in a program that will make it possible for pupils to rent all of their basal and supplementary books, announces H. Lee Thomas, county superintendent of schools. This will eliminate the former practice of renting each book separately.




