Resettlement What and Why

Editor's Note—This is question five of a series of questions and answers about the Resettlement Administration which are being published each week in The Pilot.

Is the purchase of unproductive land of any immediate value to the people of the United States?

Answer

The people who are living on the land are unable to get a satisfactory living from it. The total average gross income for the families on land being purchased by the Resettlement Administration is less than \$400 a year. Naturally if these people are being helped to move they will be able to obtain a higher standard of living immediately.

It is not only these people who will immediately benefit. The taxpayers in their vicinity will also benefit. On over half of the land which the Resettlement Administration is buying, taxes have been delinquent for two years or more. Continuation of this condition means a constant drain on the public finances. Tax collections are poor, permitting in turn only the most meager services in schools and roads. At the same time relief rolls are large, necessitating the expenditure of large sums to help the distressed families. In one township in these poor-land areas, out of more than seventy families all but one were on relief. In one project area the cost of upkeep of the roads exceeds the value of the land they serve. In another area the road costs amounted to \$27,000 whereas the yearly tax receipts from the area were only \$1,820.

Even a casual study of instances such as these indicates clearly that money can be saved for the taxpayers far in excess of the purchase price of such land, when families are moved and roads and schools closed.
