Establish Pre-Natal Clinics in County

Plans Will Be Perfected at Meeting of Women on September 19th

On Saturday, September 19th, at 3:00 p. m. the second county-wide meeting of women interested in the maternity situation in Moore county will be held in the office of Miss Flora McDonald in the court house in Carthage.

Miss Margaret McQueen, the new full-time welfare nurse who began work on July 1st, will discuss the establishment of permanent monthly maternity clinics in six different places in the county. Permanent committees and health leaders from every section of the county will be listed with Miss McQueen to help with the work.

It is earnestly desired that every part of the county shall be represented at this meeting and that every woman's organization in the county lend its interest and cooperation in this worthwhile bit of social service.

"No expectant mother in Moore county approaching the ordeal of childbirth without proper pre-natal care and the assurance of adequate medical supervision during and after confinement, both for herself and her newborn infant" is the maternity center's slogan for this year.
