Four in County Lose Right to Drive Cars

One Must Pay For Damage to Car of Deputy Clerk of Court Cole

Miss Mary Gilbert Cole, deputy clerk of the court of Moore county, is to be paid damage to her automobile which resulted from Alonzo Sheffield's running into the car, and he is to pay the court cost if he would have his 60-day road sentence, imposed by Judge Rowe in Recorder's court on Monday suspended.

Sheffield, a white man of Carthage, pleaded guilty to charges of careless and reckless driving and hit-and-run driving. His license to drive was revoked for twelve months. Luckily, the damage to the car was slight and neither Miss Cole nor Sheffield was injured in the collision.

Sentences of 30 days on the roads to be suspended upon payment of a \$50 fine and the costs and revocation of driver's license for twelve months were meted to Carlton McKenzie, white of Pinehurst, Martin Ferguson, white of Southern Pines, and Beecher Brown, white of Hemp, for driving while intoxicated.

Percy Covington, a colored preacher of excellent repute whose home is at Gibson, was so interested in a conversation which he was holding with one of his church men that he forgot to stop before entering a highway. His 30-day road sentence was suspended upon payment of the costs.

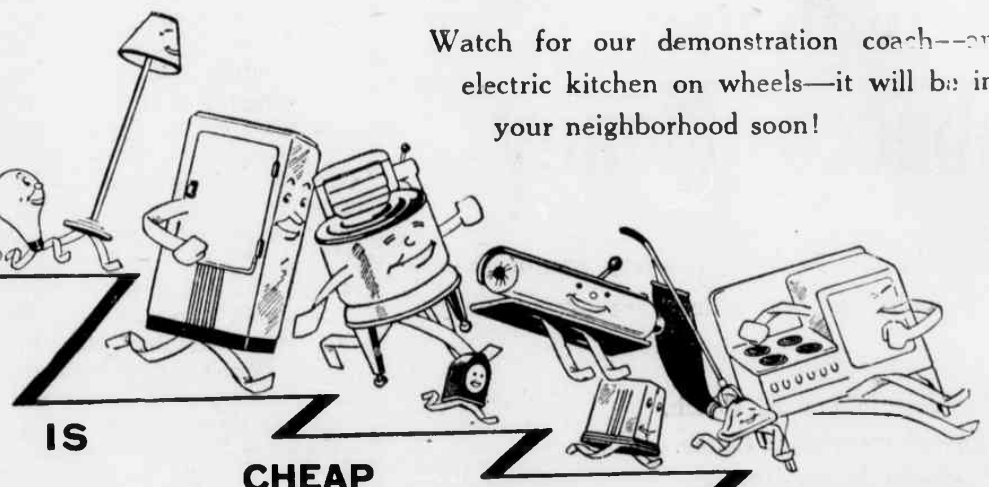
