Eighty-Seven Deaths in State in August; Total For Year Over 600

Highway fatalities last month rose sharply over the total for July but continued to run behind the toll for the corresponding month last year, official statistics of the State Highway Patrol reveal.

During August there were 87 deaths on the highways of the state and 687 persons were injured in the there were 92 highway deaths, with cidents.

itles for investigation. Thus, while the number of injuries and total number of wrecks appears larger this August than last, patrol officials believe this to be a distortion resulting from improved accident facilities.

For the year, the death toll stood at 601 on August 1. This compared with 641 on the same day last year. Pedestrians continued to form the principal victims of the highways. During August, 30 persons who were walking along highways or attempting to cross city streets were struck down by motorists with fatal consequences. Seventy-seven were reported injured.

Next most frequent victim was the motorist who ran into nothing, but from speeding or other reason, permitted his car to get out of control, Twenty-four of his kind died in August and 174 were reported injured.


