- —has built up a huge bureaucracy which has shown no regard for the Constitutional rights and liberties of our citizens.
- —has converted the Federal Civil Service into a bare-faced spoils system.
- —has used the money of taxpayers of all political parties to build up a propaganda machine to aid its efforts to continue in power.
