At one time I understand that it was quite common to see many nice colts, both horses and mules. For the last several years this has not been true. In one part of the county, above Hemp, some nice mares are being brought in again.

Through the cooperation of L. R. Grimm and the E. R. A. we were able to borrow a good Jack. At the present time this Jack is out from Pinehurst but will soon be moved to a permanent location, either out from Carthage or near Hemp. There isn't any reason why a good many colts could not be raised in this section every year. Some mules as fine as any I ever saw were raised here in the upper end of Moore county. These people keep good horses and mules and they take good care of them. At the present time we are hoping to get this Jack placed at the McLean place with Mr. Ragsdale. Later on he will be moved somewhere in the upper end of the county.
