

Army To Enlist 1800 Men in This Corps Area

To Bring Personnel Up To Full Strength of 165,000, Gen. Moseley Announces

Jobs for more than 1,800 young men in the Fourth Corps Area are open in the United States Army.

Within the next few weeks, enlistments will be made under War Department orders to bring the Army up to full authorized strength of 165,000, it was announced today by Major General George Van Horn Moseley, Commanding General for the Fourth Corps Area at Atlanta, Ga.

Applications already are being taken at recruiting stations in the eight southeastern states which make up the Fourth Corps Area, but vacancies for more than 1,800 soldiers are still available.

Recruits not only are offered the opportunity of service in the Army of the United States, but also have the chance to extend their education, take vocational training in the Army schools and prepare themselves for careers, either continuing in the Army or in civilian life after their enlistments expire.

There are 17 recruiting stations in the eight states, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida, Alabama, Tennessee, Mississippi and Louisiana, which are in the Fourth Corps Area. In addition, for the next 30 days, there will be ten roving parties of recruiters canvassing sections of these states which are not near a recruiting station.

Announcements of times and dates when these parties will visit particular localities of these states will be announced later by District Recruiting Officers.

Applicants for service must be between the ages of 18 and 35 and physically fit. They will be enlisted as privates with a monthly pay of \$21—but most of that is velvet, as the Army provides food, clothing, shelter and medical care.

There is a wide field of choice open to the recruits. They may apply for assignment as follows:

1. To the Infantry, Coast Artillery, Field Artillery or Engineers in the Panama Canal Zone. There are openings for more than 500 recruits for the Panama service.

2. To Tanks, Infantry, Field Artillery or Quartermaster Corps in the Fourth Corps Area.

3. To Infantry in the First Corps Area, comprising the New England states.

4. To Infantry or Field Artillery in the Second Corps Area comprising New York, New Jersey and Delaware.

5. To Coast Artillery at Fort Barrancas, Florida.

Recruits should not make the mistake and decide upon Army life as a "gravy train", because Uncle Sam expects them to become proficient in the varied duties of a soldier. While the opportunity for the ambitious recruit is there, the lazy man will find he has chosen the wrong vocation. In fact, the Army does not desire to enlist men not of good character and good habits. But for the man who is willing to apply himself to his duties, the Army offers a vast field, and 1,800 young soldiers will have the opportunity to mould honorable lives for themselves in circumstances which they might never reach in civilian life.

Full details concerning opportunities in the Army may be obtained from the nearest recruiting office and from the nearest recruiting office and from Headquarters Fourth Corps Area, Atlanta, Ga. Since the quota for this Corps Area must be filled within a short time, young men considering enlistment should not delay in filing their applications.

a red letter Achievement Day in that this is the twenty-fifth year of home demonstration work in North Carolina.

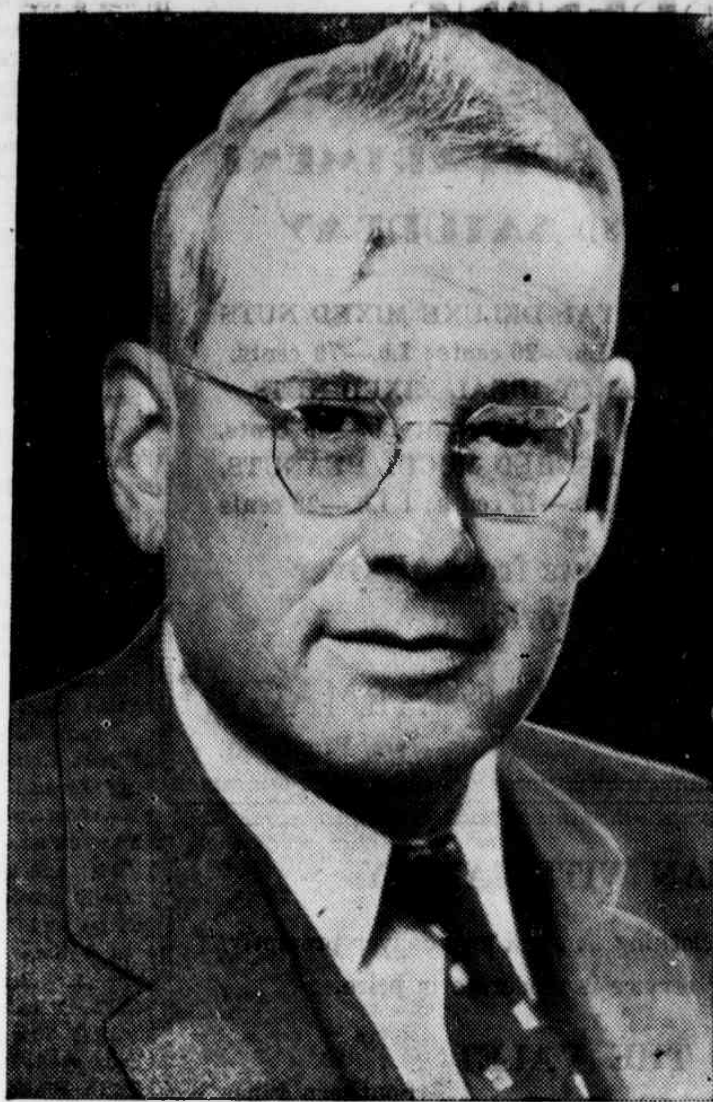
