James and Jackson Boyd maintain a private pack of foxhounds for their friends who hunt with them three times each week. Weekly gymkhanas will start the 4th of December and continue throughout the winter. The entries for the opening show will include some of the best jumpers training in this section. There are miles of bridle trails to invite those who enjoy horseback riding.

Quail hunting is another popular pastime in the Sandhills. The quail season opened this month and will remain open until February. Reports are that there is an abundance of birds this year. The deer season is now open and already more than fifty bucks have been killed this season.

In addition to a number of golf tournaments, of which the Women's Ninth Annual MidSouth Championship to be played at the Southern Pines Country Club is the most outstanding, there are also a number of tennis events on the calendar. The town maintains two very fine tennis courts in the municipal park and other courts are provided at the hotels and clubs.

Hotel Accommodations

It is within sixty-five miles of Chapel Hill where the University of North Carolina is located, one of the oldest universities in the country. Southern Pines is within thirty-five miles of Fort Bragg, the largest artillery reservation in the country, and only a few miles from Fort Bragg is Fayetteville where an old slave market is located

The town maintains a modern fire department. It has one of the latest designed water plants with a grading reservoir covers more than six hundred acres of land and is supplied by springs. The milk supply of the town is under the control of the North Carolina State Board of Health. The town has adopted the Standard Milk Ordinance recommend. ed by the U.S. Department of Health in Washington. A very rigid inspection of dairies and equipment is made daily.
