## FULLY ACCREDITED HIGH SCHOOL IN SOUTHERN PINES

Graduates Accepted for College Admission Without Entrance Examinations

### VARIED CURRICULUM

Southern Pines is proud of its school. And deservedly so.

To begin with, the High School department is a member of the Association of Secondary Colleges and Schools of the South, which means it is a fully accredited institution whose graduates are acceptable to collegiate institutions without entrance examinations.

Secondly, its Dramatic Club has won the Championship of North Carolina for three successive years; its Choral Club high honors in State music contests.

Thirdly, it offers in addition to its regular college preparatory curriculum, training courses in business, with a wide variety of vocational choice for the pupils.

The school has a Science Club, an honorary scholastic society known as the Beta Club, and a chapter of the Hi-Y Club, a Christian Fellowship organization.

The school boasts of a splendid library, with trained librarians.

In athletics it has teams in tennis, baseball, basketball and golf which creditably represents the school.

The Southern Pines School is growing each year. This fall its registration figures show a total enrollment of 550, forty more pupils than a year ago. There are 390 in the elementary grades and 160 in high school.

## FIRE DEPARTMENT KEEPS LOSS DOWN TO MINIMUM HERE

Southern Pines' Newly Acquired Apparatus Has Been Great Aid to Volunteers

### O'CALLAGHAN IS CHIEF

The Southern Pines Volunteer Fire Company, now entering its 38th year of active and efficient service to the community, during the 11 months of the present year answered 30 alarms, one for assistance asked by Sanford, one to the Johnson farm at Drowning Creek, two at Lakeview, and one at Vass, a territory covering an area from 28 miles north to 15 miles south of Southern Pines. Several brush fires, of which two were of wide scope, increased the calls for assistance. Two fires, the Jackson Boyd, and Knowles house, were fought in the bitterest weather of the winter, while the burning of a small outhouse on the James Boyd estate disclosed in the death of James Douglas the department's first tragedy.

Just a year ago the city commissioners purchased a new La-France truck for \$5,500 and this new piece of apparatus, designed for an almost instantaneous response to an alarm and requiring but a small crew, has been instrumental in subduing the greater number of fires with but small damage to houses or furnishings.

City Commissioner L. V. O'Callaghan is Chief of the department. L. S. Rowell is assistant chief, Albert Adams captain and Clyde T. Dunn driver of the apparatus on full time service.
