The estate comprises 258 acres, with a fine residence, private gymnasium, swimming pool, six-car garage, stables and farm buildings. The house, surrounded by gardens, lawns and shade trees, with the swimming pool close by, contains about 12 rooms, with numerous sleeping porches. There are gate houses at each of the two entrances from Youngs Road, and the property has its own water tower.

Mr. and Mrs. Halliwell made their winter home here for several years, but the estate has been unoccupied for the past few seasons. It adjoins the property of Mrs. Reid Healy and Stanley W. Burke.

## MRS. FISHER TO ATTEND SON'S WEDDING SATURDAY

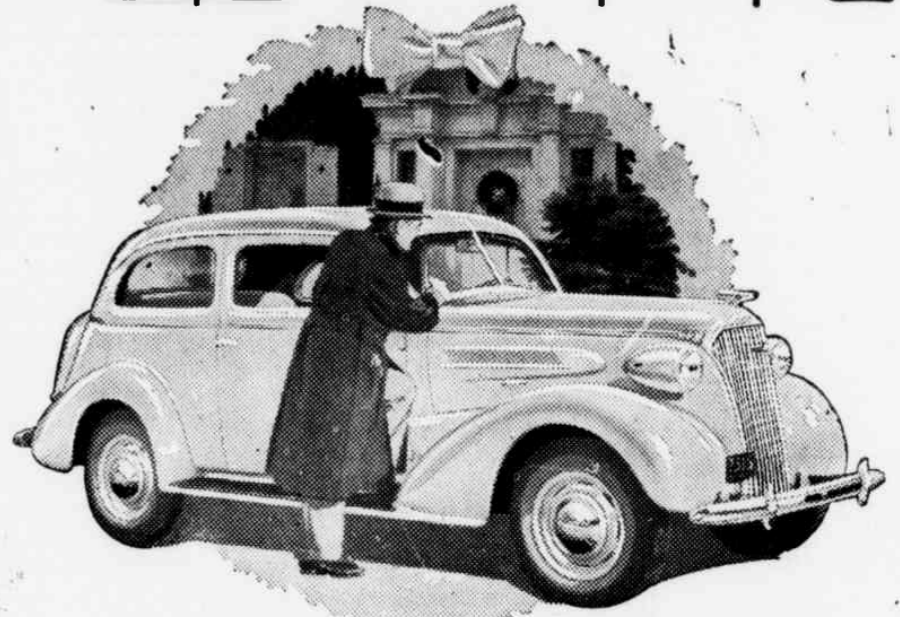
