TOWNE FLEE SPAIN AT OUTBREAK OF HOSTILITIES

(Continued from page 1) Towne spoke no Spanish and they no English, the resulting 14-hour conference was carried on in French. Finally, Mr. Towne armed himself with an imposing array of letters and documents from official sources and the committee reluctantly gave up the car.

"It had been used, but carefully," he said, "and no harm was done."

"But our experience was as nothing compared to what happened to some friends of ours," Mr. Towne added, "They sailed across to the island of Minorca. That was in anti-Fascist hands and when the committee there saw their fine car and chauffeur they ordered them to stop. The chauffeur became rattled and backed up the car and the soldiers thought our friends were trying to get away so they lined them up against a convenient wall and were about to call out the firing squad when someone identified them as English and the soldiers couldn't get them out of town fast enough. Again the fear of English reprisals was most effective."

"And what do you think of the situation as it stands today?" we asked.

"Well," he replied, "It's difficult to say. So much has happened there since the trouble broke out and the picture has changed so often that I can't be sure just where my sympathies lie."

"Will you go back again some day," we asked.

"If there's anything left to see when they get through over there," Mr. Towne replied, "It's a beautiful country and a wonderful place to travel."

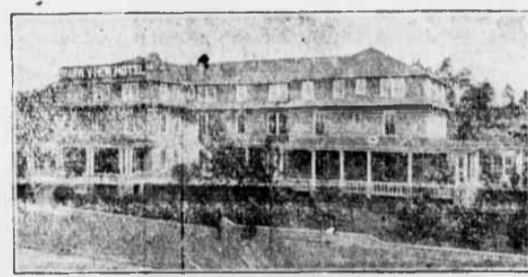
