"As soon as the seeds are sown wheat, rye or oat straw which has Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Dowdy and been thoroughly thrashed should be should be evenly broadcast. Twenty pounds of straw is sufficient to each 100 square vards. Then the canvas is placed on the straw and pegged to the ground around the edges of the bed to prevent the cloth from blowing off. The advantage of the straw is that it prevents the seed from being beaten into the ground too deeply by heavy rains and at the same time keeps the top of the soil moist. This enables the seed to germinate a week to ten days earlier than they normally would under average seasonal conditions. It generally requires about 100 square yards of seeds for each two acres of tobacco that is to be planted

One level teaspoonful of clean seed, if evenly sown over the bed, will give an ideal stand of plants."

The tobacco seed cleaner has been sent back to the factory for repairs, but should be back in about a weeks seed again.
