ground floor and the Physio-therapy and Dental departments, that have previously been cramped for space, have been moved to more commodious quarters in the new wing. The space in the main building vacated by these departments will be converted to sitting rooms and waiting rooms for patients and visitors.

In the new wing, also, there will be an office for the hospital staff and a nurses' class room that will accommodate 25 persons. Previously classes for the nurses were held in the dining room and the staff had no specific office quarters.

Though the new wing has been financed through a federal grant of funds, county aid and private subscriptions, money is still needed to pay for equipping the addition, Paul Dana, treasurer of the hospital, reports generous donations during the past month, but "more still are needed and will be more than welcome," he said yesterday.

### "SANDHILLEERS" PROPOSED TO UNIFY THE SANDHILLS

that the plans and early accomplishments of the founders of Pinehurst and the fidelity to these original ideals sustained as far as they were during the depression have laid a foundation which is able to sustain the sterling qualities of noble Athos who sacrificed his heritage for the good of his companion and thus achieved real nobility.

"But the Three Musketeers, friendly as they were, each striving separately to serve their Captain and King, were only three fine guardsmen until a solidifying purpose and aim came to them in the person of an apparent outsider. D'Artagan was the country-man from far-off Gascony. In him was combined the strength of the agricultural life with the conquering characteristics of representative centralization of power in councils of leadership and governance.

Carthage, our citadel, court and county seat, brings not only its contribution to business and industry but brings another side to the triangle and we may now stand four-square. So that as Dumas records it: 'And now, Gentleman,' said D'Artagan, without stopping to explain his conduct to Porthos—'All for one, one for all, that is our advice, is it not?'

Following up his line of thought, Mr. Denny outlined some of the things we do not have in the Sandhills:

"No company of National Guards; no armory therefor. No stadium, not even a stand large enough to absorb, reflect and reverberate the voice of Mrs. Montenanti when she offers 'the leg' to de chick."

"No swimming pool with adjustable walls and ceiling of glass adjoined by bath house of a proper type for those who would prefer peaceful America to mused-up Europe. No system of playgrounds and adequately equipped outdoor swimming, boating and fishing ponds and lakes.

"Not a single library building.

"Not an auditorium worthy of the name.

"No beginning of an art gallery.

"No riding and jumping academy building.

"No theatre building that does not look better with the lights out. And may I advise that in the city of Miami alone this past summer 25 hotels were built.

"After building, man is an organizationist. What are some of our lacks in organizations with which we are at feud?

"Here there is no citizen-directed Sandhills-wide charity organization.

"No co-ordinating group to sustain such fine individual organizations already functioning alone as the Red Cross, T. B. association and hospital auxiliaries.

"No citizen assistance to an almost entirely dormant Juvenile Court.

"No citizen effort to have all property equitably listed, or listed at all for tax purposes. Slot machines are legally operated in the county but a tax provided is not even levied.

"No effort to supply each township with a proper Justice of the Peace.

"No vehicle through which citizens may voice public opinion concerning our Raleigh-controlled schools and roads without being designated as either meddlers or disgruntled non-co-operators or maybe that trash pile to which many cowardly arguers toss everything they don't like—Communism, Reds, Reds, Reds.

"No organization to offer intelligent assistance to the employer and employee in industries which live in our midst only because of cheap labor, or to workers who demand greater wages than they earn simply because the boss is rich. And thirdly, with the legislature in session, we have no effort being made for the passage of legislation that we might need or try to prevent the passage of much we could do better without. And finally, Gentlemen, just a few examples or instances of a lack of co-operation.

"Four chambers of commerce and not a connecting door between them.

"No major W. P. A. projects demanded have been denied. If we are not refused some we are not asking for enough.

"Eight weekly publications in the county. One to each 3,500 people—men, women and children, white and colored.

"No profit from the largest retail business of the county but the headache.

"In conclusion, Gentlemen, in order that we may follow President Charlie in his efforts this year to unify and co-ordinate the Sandhills under the motto of 'All for one, one for all,' may the hope be expressed that this club whose membership is made up from the towns of Aramis, Porthos, Athos and D'Artagan, establish in lieu of the musketeers, the four groups of Sandhilleers and work and live 'All for one, one for all.'"
