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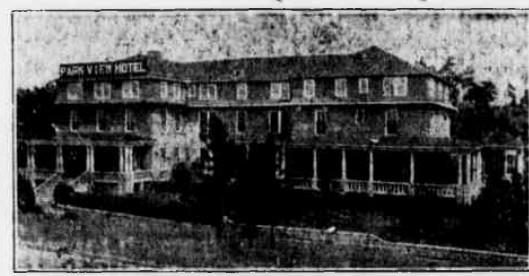

The picture today was rapidly becoming an industrial one and the nations of the world were fashioning their legislative set-ups accordingly, in order to meet the rapidly changing conditions, our program here in America was still based on a constitution written 150 years ago to suit the needs and requirements of a then purely agrarian nation and that, in order to bring ourselves up to date, we need a more elastic and pliable legislative system that can and will meet the changing situations occasioned by a world gone industrial.

S. P. LIBRARY PLANS TO INCREASE USEFULNESS

An attempt has been made herewith to present a well-balanced selection, adapted to a wide variety of tastes; yet it is by no means the list which the committee would have been glad to offer. It begins indeed with three items recommended for purchase a month ago, and held over until additional funds were available. "Glass Flowers" is a meager effort to meet the criticism that the library does not supply enough poetry, —fortunately supplemented by the gift of The Oxford Book of Modern English Verse, edited by William Butler Yeats. "The Return to Religion" and "A Fool Hath Said" were bought in one month, to compensate in some degree for a recent weakness in the section for religious books. But "Tonight at 8:30," a group of plays by Noel Coward, had to be omitted, because the "Best Plays of 1935-36" was purchased a month ago. "War and Peace" was included in accordance with the library's policy of adding at least one "classic" to its shelves each month; yet it is a sad compromise with a list which originally included four nineteenth cen-

tury poets, the plays of Sophocles, and Madame Bovary. "Behind the Spanish Barricades" meets a repeated request; but "The Olive Field" by Ralph Bates—a splendid great tapestry of present-day Spain, timely and important, had to be stricken from the final list. So too did "The Street of the Fishing Cat" by Joan Folds, winner of the All-Nations prize novel competition, in which "Steps Going Down," by John McIntyre—already on the shelves—was the successful American entry. So too did many others.

One of the functions of a library is, naturally, to buy books and such books as will be most acceptable to its readers. But the preceding paragraph will perhaps serve to suggest the recurring problems of the book committee, and thus of the library as a whole. It will be a definite help if suggestions are made by members. Preference is always given, of course, to books which have been requested. Members should leave lists with the librarian at the first of each month.

People say some times that they always meant to join the library, but they just somehow never got around to it. They say that they have meant to support it, but haven't found the time. The library is a community enterprise, of definite value to the business and social interests of the town. It needs, and deserves, attention. Go in and look around? You will be very welcome.
