

**To Vaccinate All Dogs
In County by April 30**

**Law To Be Rightfully Enforced
to Prevent Rabies, Dr. Sym-
ington Announces**

A conference was held at the Public Health office, Carthage last week on the subject of rabies. A number of people were bitten during 1936 by mad dogs and nine patients took anti-rabic treatment at the Public Health office and other places. Several private practitioners also administered anti-rabic treatment.

A case of hydrophobia developed in the county last December and unfortunately the patient died in the Moore County Hospital.

"A law was passed several years ago that every dog in the State of North Carolina must be vaccinated every year between January 1st and April 30th, says Dr. J. Symington, Public Health Officer. Since the law was passed a great number of dogs have been vaccinated each year, but not all in Moore county. As vaccination is the method adopted by county and the State for stamping out rabies it is best in our opinion that the law should be literally compiled with. In 1937 there will be more thorough investigation and follow-up work done than has been done in the past year.

"This preliminary notice is to advise dog owners that Dr. J. I. Neal, a qualified veterinarian and well known in Moore county, will arrange for the vaccination of dogs throughout the county. In every voting precinct a center for vaccination will be selected.

"We hope that every dog owner will see to it that every dog receives anti-rabic vaccination without exception before April 30th, and it will be best to be on time and avoid a rush at the last minute."

**A. McDougald Cameron,
Age 74, Passes at Vass**

**Came To This Section From
Harnett County to Join Late A.
Cameron in Lumber Business**

R. McDougald Cameron respected citizen of Vass, passed away at his home around 6:00 o'clock Thursday evening, January 21, following an illness of several weeks. He would have been seventy-five years of age in March.

The funeral service was conducted at Cameron Hill church in Harnett county at 3:00 o'clock Friday afternoon by the Rev. M. D. McNeill, Presbyterian minister of Cameron, and interment was in the cemetery there.

Mr. Cameron was a native of Harnett county, but had resided in Vass for more than a quarter of a century. When the manufacture of yellow pine lumber was one of the leading industries here, Mr. Cameron moved to Vass to work for A. Cameron, who at that time was operating a planing mill near the site of the present furniture plant, and later, he entered the employ of the Vass Cotton Mill Company, retaining his connection there until his death. He was a quiet, unassuming man who had many friends.

Fifty years ago, Mr. Cameron was united in marriage to Miss Katie Cameron of Harnett, who survives, along with ten of the eleven children born to them, fifty-eight grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

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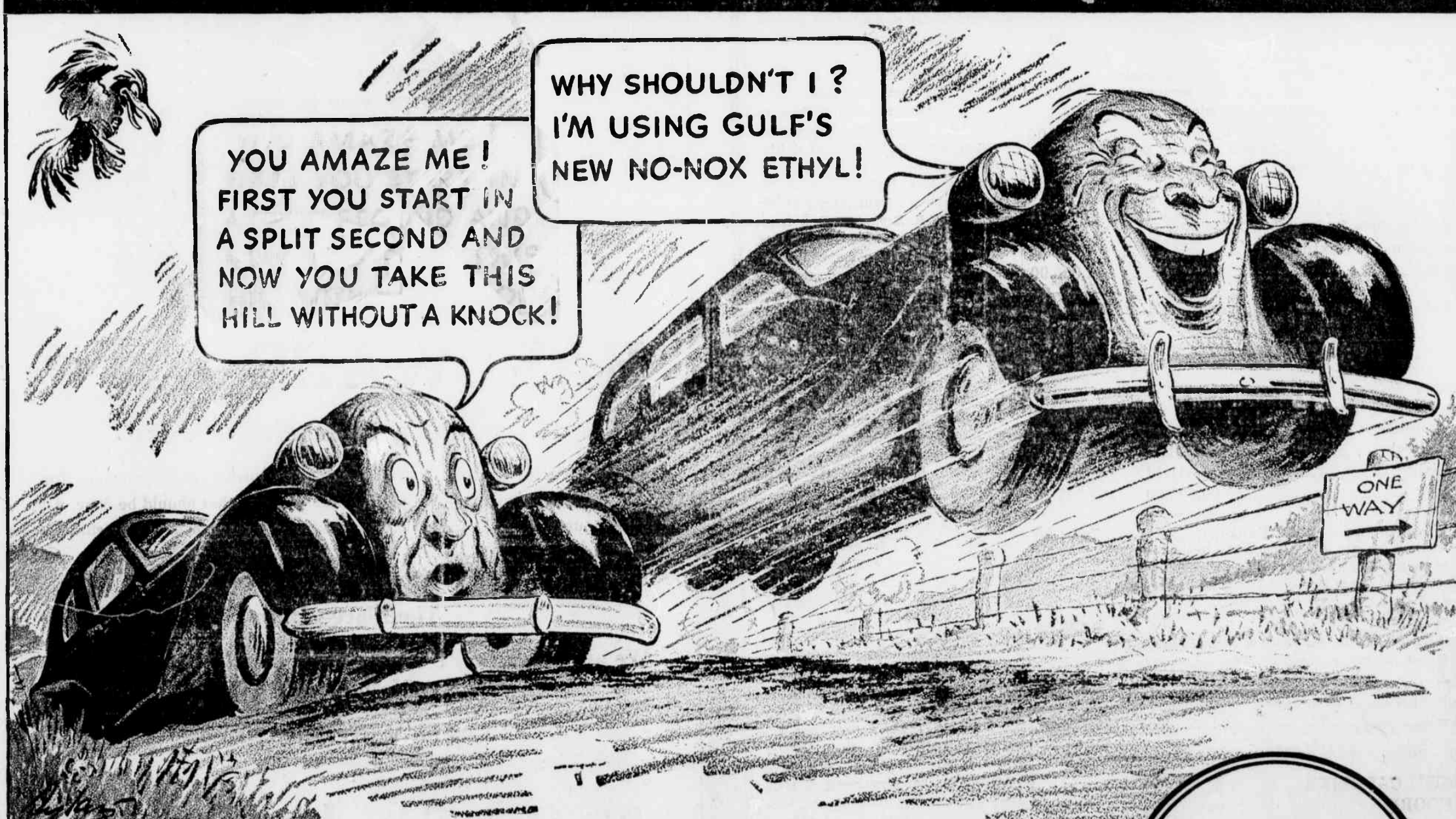
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
