Horner Case Continued in Recorder's Court

Fowler Gets Fine and Suspended Sentence For Assault on W. H. Goins

James Horner, driver of the automobile in which Charles C. and William Milam of Southern Pines met their death a few weeks ago, was scheduled to face a charge of manslaughter in Recorder's Court on Monday, but the case was continued. The warrant charges that Horner was operating a motor vehicle in a careless, reckless and heedless manner while under the influence of intoxicating beverages at the time of the fatal accident.

George Fowler, charged with assaulting W. H. Goins with a shotgun, was given three months on the roads, this to be suspended upon payment of a fine of \$25 and the costs, and upon condition of good behavior for twelve months. His fine was later reduced to \$12.50.

W. H. Parker, found guilty of public drunkenness, disorderly conduct and making threats, was given a ten months sentence, this to be suspended upon condition that he pay the costs and leave the county for two years.

Ed Worthy, charged with public drunkenness, disorderly conduct and the larceny of a pair of stockings, was sent to the roads for 60 days.

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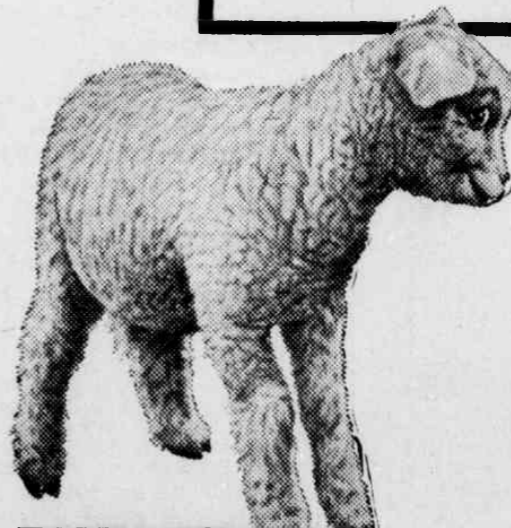

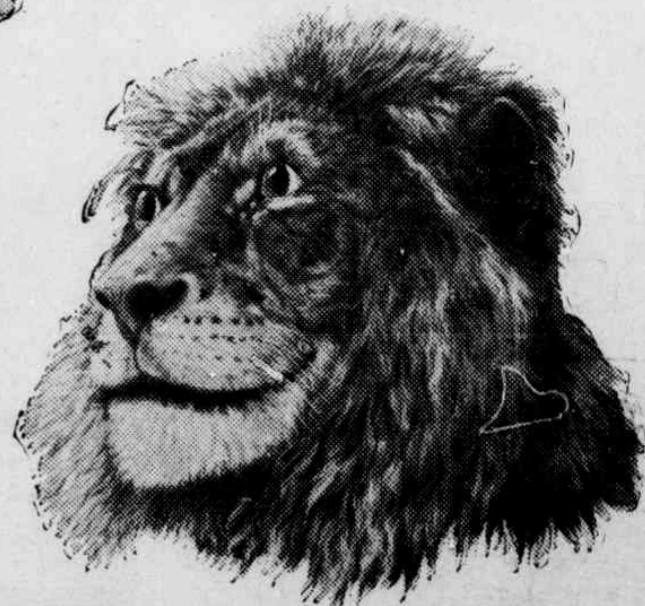
