Patrolman Ed Newton Nabs Store Thief

Denver Man Caught in Act; May Be Wanted by Federal Agents in Washington

Caught in the act of attempting to burglarize the Hayes Book store in Southern Pines Sunday night, Howard Greiner, 28 years old, of Denver, Col., is languishing in the local jail awaiting police investigation into possible other deprivations in the Sandhills of late. Greiner was engaged in his nefarious occupation of seeing what Claude Hayes had to offer when Night Patrolman Ed Newton spied him. Newton let Greiner see him in front of the store, then dashed around back where he knew the marauder would be attempting his getaway, and nabbed him as he emerged from the window through which he had entered the shop.

Greiner will be taken to Carthage today for arraignment in Recorder's Court, and in the meanwhile local police are checking his record through usual police channels. There is said to be a suspicion that he may be wanted by Federal authorities.

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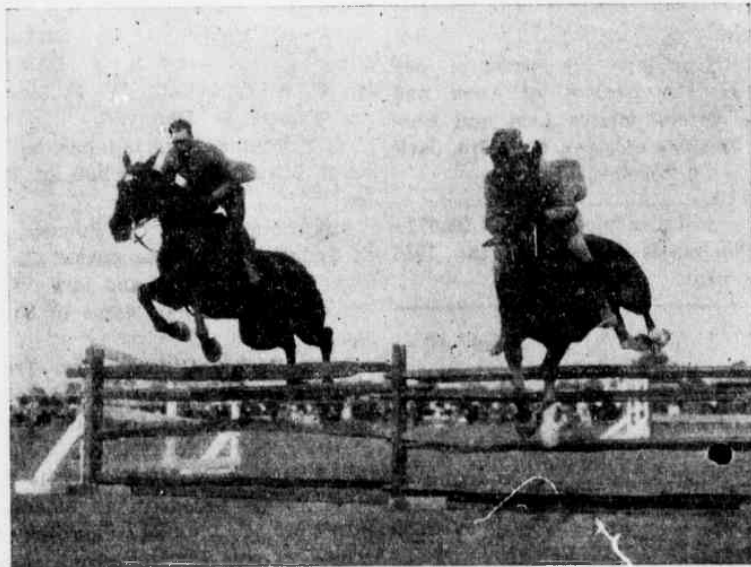
