





I. C. Sledge, treasurer of Pinehurst, Inc., informed The Pilot that the damage amounted to approximately \$10,000, covered my insurance, and that there has not as yet been any discussion of rebuilding plans. For the present the horses will be stabled in the smaller frame barn located beside the burned structure.

Tuesday night's blaze served as the initiation of Pinehurst's new fire engine, the latest in fire-fighting equipment, which had been delivered here but a few days before. The efficiency of this apparatus, plus the splendid work of the firemen, prevented the spread of flames to adjacent buildings and to gasoline storage tanks located in the vicinity of the stables.
