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October Weather

Month Was Colder Than Normal, Through Mercury Reached 90 on the 7th

With the light frost of the early morning hours of the 15th, the greenery began its seasonal change to the vivid hues of Autumn. Sixteen days of the month were all clear, ten partly cloudy, five cloudy, and five with more or less rainfall. The highest temperature, 90 degrees, came on the 7th, and the lowest, 29, on the 15th.

The month was decidedly colder than usual, the average temperature for the month registering nearly six degrees less than the long time normal, and a full nine degree less than the previous October.

Two inches of rain fell on the 19th, the total for the month being 3.2 inches, closely approximating three-quarters of an inch less than normal, though the overplus for the ten months of the year is now 6.21 inches.
