## Dr. McKimmon Speaker at Farmers Club Meet

Assistant Extension Director of State Gives Sound Advice to Parents, at Carthage

Dr. Jane S. McKimmon, assistant Extension director of North Carolina addressed the Moore County Farmers Club and their wives at a meeting held in the courthouse on Thursday evening, January 19. Following dinner, which was served by the Carthage P. T. A., J. Hawley Poole of West End called the meeting to order. Miss Flora McDonald, county home agent introduced Dr. McKimmon and in her introduction attributed her great success to her strength of body, strength of mind, the courage of her conviction and her faith in God.

Mrs. McKimmon based her talk on the family. "Home making can be a happy, successful undertaking," she said, "only when there is a cooperative attitude in the family group. The mother is a home engineer to promote order, companionship, health and freedom in the home. She must see that her home has a friendly arrangement, for to be a well ordered home it must be peaceful, quiet and comfortable."

In discussing the children in the home Dr. McKimmon said, "Fathers and mothers are personality builders." She recommended patient training from the beginning in order to form right habits early in young lives. "Discipline by all means," said the speaker. "If we don't discipline them now, life will discipline them later on. Obedience is a by-product of kind relationship we establish with the child." She is of the opinion that children who come from large families are more able to get along with others and more apt to be successful in the business world. Letting a child mingle with the community group is one of the best ways to put him in his place. Give your child a chance to struggle, for it takes hard struggle to develop the moral and physical muscles. Every one who has been a great success in the world has gained that success by good hard work." In conclusion Dr. McKimmon said "let your training begin early, first in school and church. We reap in adolescence what we have sown in youth."

Other interesting features on the program were short talks by Mrs. Esther Willis, district home agent, who stressed the importance of encouraging the boys and girls in the home beautification project this year, and L. B. Altman, district farm agent, who urged the farm men and women to cooperate with the agents in putting across the land use project. Vocal selections were rendered by Mrs. M. G. Dalrymple of Carthage. Seventy-six members attended the meeting.

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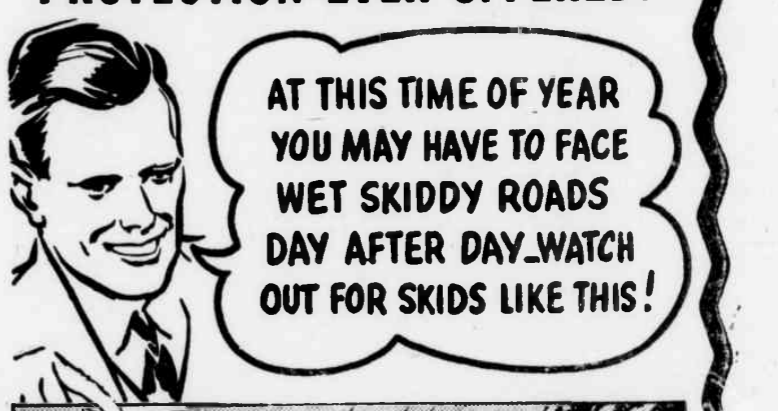
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
