That the List Takers for McNeill Township, Moore County, will sit at the following places at the times named (and at all other times during the month of April, 1939, at So. Pines, at which places and in which month all property owners and taxpayers in said Township are required to return to the List Takers for taxation for the year 1939, all the Real Estate, Personal Property, etc., which each one shall own on the first day of April, or shall be required to give in then. All male persons between the ages of 21 and 50 years are to list their polls during the same time. Return of Property and giving in of polls are required under the penalties imposed by law.

Thereby obviating much trouble. Only females and non-residents of townships and persons physically unable to attend and file their lists can appoint agents to list property.

TRUCK Data ERY

FARM CENSUS—Each farm owner shall prepare a list of the acreage of each crop FUL grown, including acres of truck. The list should show the total acres cultivated by the owner, also the acres cultivated by tenants on each separately recognized farm, the acres in improved pasture, woodland, idle and other lands. He shall be required to report the number of bearing fruit trees, the number of livestock of breeding age, number of hogs sold or slaughtered during the past 12 months and tons of fertilizer to be used during this crop year. This information is kept confidential and has no relation to taxes. Its purpose is for agricultural education, economic analysis and safer guidance of county agents and farmers generally.
