"There is no place for youth and old age in our present way of living," said Dr. Howard Odum in discussing Home and Family Life Problems at the Home and Family Life Institute in Greensboro last Thursday. He stated that youth is less bright than ever before and that there was no room for the old in our modern apartments.

Dr. Merle Mossman presented the following questions for discussion: What do you know of your community? How can you know your community? Do you utilize the resources of your community? What contributions do you make to your community?

### Negro Held For Fatal Shooting in Aberdeen

#### James McKenzie Accused of Killing Uncle, Spence McNeill, Last Saturday

James Henry McKenzie, colored, of Aberdeen is being held in the Moore county jail to await trial for the fatal shooting of his uncle, Spence McNeill, which occurred last Saturday night.

Sheriff C. J. McDonald said that officers were informed that McKenzie was drunk Saturday night in the section known as Berkeley, and that Spence McNeill and Ernest Taylor carried him home, put him to bed, and then sat down. McKenzie, a short time later, got up and without saying anything shot McNeill, who passed away almost immediately, officers were told.

A coroner's jury found that McNeill came to his death by a gunshot wound, the gun being in the hands of McKenzie.

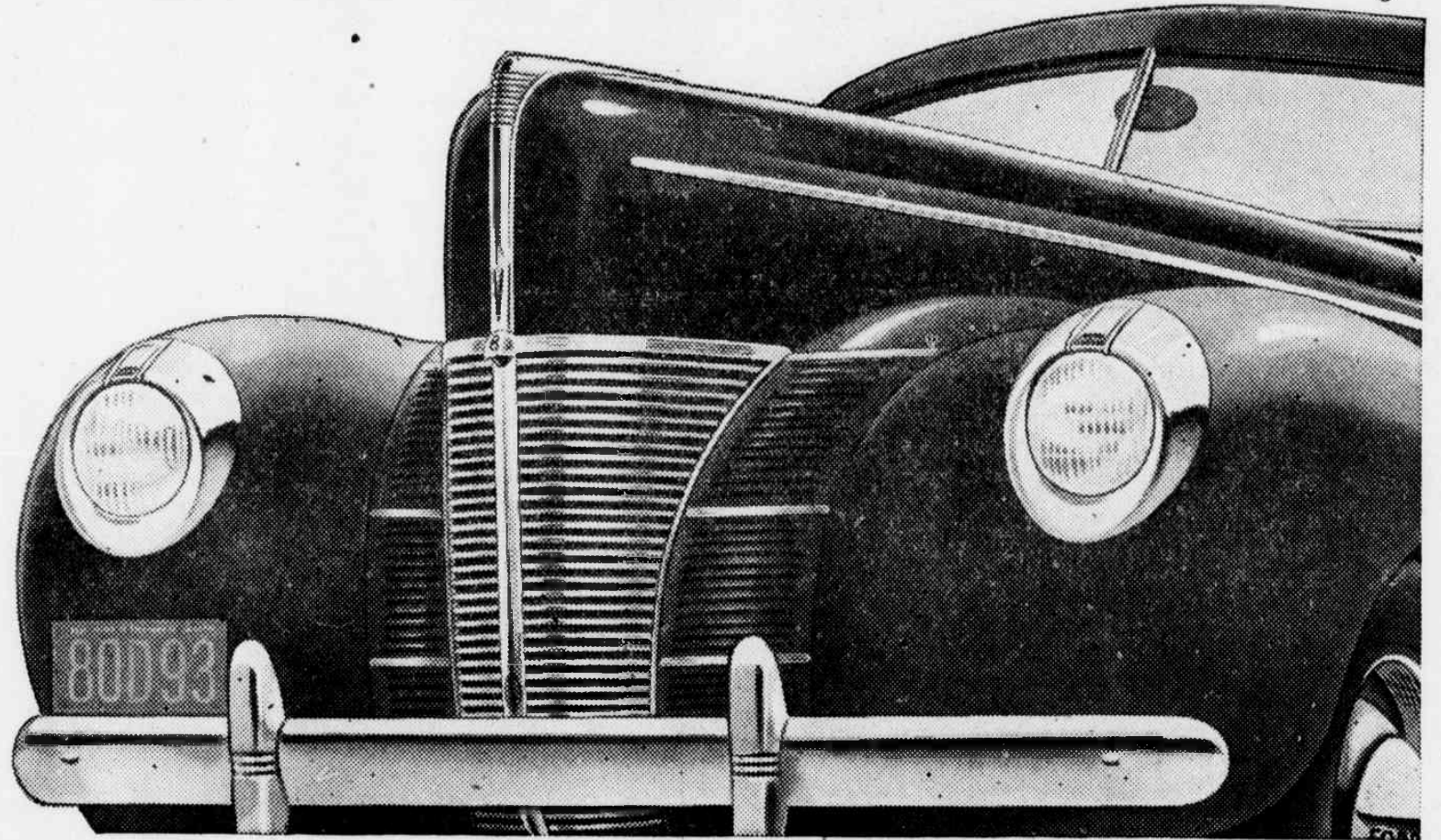
