**Art Exhibition Viewed By 200 at Pine Needles**

**Harry Galloway Collection of Prints and Books Presented by Miss Pierson**

Some two hundred of the cottage colony and residents of Southern Pines and Pinehurst who were privileged to attend the art exhibition and tea given by Miss Catherine Pierson of Southern Pines Saturday afternoon at the Pine Needles Club were deeply impressed with the wide range of subjects and material which Harry Galloway had brought here from his galleries in New York.

While the exhibition was essentially one of rare old prints, Mr. Galloway had added to the display this year a collection of early books on birds and flowers, a few oil portraits from Florence, Italy, and England, and some very amusing original water colors by Madeline Luka depicting scenes of hunting and fishing under circumstances which would hardly meet with the requirements of the modern sportsman.

Among the collection of books of both local and historical interest was a copy of Catesby on Carolina Birds. The only other copy known to be in existence is on exhibition in the Governor's Palace at Williamsburg. To those who have seen it there roped off and with an attendant mounting guard over it, it inspired a feeling of awe to be able to examine the Galloway copy at leisure. Typical of the period was a book of verse entitled Gems of Beauty, published in 1836 which contained a poem dedicated to the birthstones representing the twelve months of the year.

Since he was here last year Mr. Galloway has greatly increased his number of mezzo tints by well known artists. Of dramatic interest was an imposing one of David Garrick. Instead of two of the John Leech sporting prints there were six on display. This addition to the collection is due to the two-page spread which was given to the John Leech prints in Life shortly after Mr. Galloway exhibited here last season. Realizing how valuable was this publicity he immediately cabled to London and was able to procure four more.

New also were the prints of old Italian panels of historical scenes which gave the appearance of tapes, try, each surrounded with a fine Renaissance border; a splendid collection of Batiste 18th century floral, and a number of marine and fruit Currier and Ives prints. With the last Mr. Galloway unwittingly stimulated trade in one small town where he was exhibiting. A newly rich inhabitant who had not attended the exhibition inquired at the local hardware store the next day for those Currier knives which she had been hearing so much about.
