

ANOTHER HAT IN RING IN FIGHT FOR SEAT IN CONGRESS

Robert L. Steele, 3d. of Rockingham Fourth To Announce For Nomination

It is a four-cornered race for Congress from this 8th district of North Carolina, and bids fair to rival in heat the great fight of 1938 when it took until months after the second primary to determine the successor to Walter Lambeth at Washington.

No. 4 to enter the lists is Robert L. Steele, 3d. young Rockingham business man, who announced this week. Previously three of the candidates in the 1938 race had tossed in their hats, the present incumbent, W. O. Burgin of Lexington, C. B. Deane, also of Rockingham, and Giles Y. Newton of Gibson. There may be a fifth candidate, none other than former Representative Lambeth, who has told Democratic National headquarters in Washington that he would decide yes or no by March 1st. Mr. Lambeth served two terms following the death of Congressman Hammer of Asheville.

Mr. Steele is 41 years old, a great nephew of the late Col. Walter L. Steele who served this district in Congress two terms from 1875 to 1879. He has wide family connections in the lower part of the district, being a son of Mrs. Bessie Little Steele, native of Anson county, and the late Robert L. Steele, II, of Richmond county, both families having been pioneers in the industrial and agricultural development of the Pee Dee section. He is a Methodist and a charter member of Rockingham Rotary. His business activities include farming, textile and lumber manufacturing. He is a director in two of the largest local mills.

"After long and careful deliberation," his statement of candidacy says, "I have decided to make the race for Congress in the interest of restoring to the Democratic party of the district a much needed measure of peace and harmony."

"I enter the race," his statement continues, "thoroughly aware of the importance of the post to which I aspire and hereby pledge myself to an honest, forthright effort to meet the needs of a constituency literally hungry for unity. I am making no effort to gain support by reason of multiple promises but if nominated and elected I promise to serve faithfully the best interest of the people as a whole."

Mark Hoffman Delight in Mid-Pines Recital

Clubhouse Filled to Capacity for Second Concert Appearance Here of Noted Pianist

On Monday afternoon at the Mid-Pines Club, the big lounge and rotunda were filled to capacity for the recital by Mark Hoffman, pianist, who returned for his second season. Mr. Hoffman said it was always so nice to be recalled, for it made one feel among friends. He made many new friends this year among the real music lovers of the Sandhills. Both recitals have been given under the management of Miss Florence Campbell, with the kind and necessary assistance of John Fitzgerald of the Mid-Pines Club in furnishing a large enough auditorium with a piano suitable for Mr. Hoffman's use. So great was the enthusiasm with which Mr. Hoffman was received, that many requests to bring him again this season have been made.

The opening number, Brahms' colossal variations of Paganini's theme, used every recourse of an artist's technique and velocity in increasing scale until one felt relieved when nothing more difficult could be added. This was followed by a Chopin group, the Scherzo and Ballade and the seldom heard Nocturne in G. Major, with its haunting exquisite melody and ever recurring run in thirds. In response to vigorous encores he played the great Valse, most beautiful waltz ever written. Mr. Hoffman proved himself a wonderful Chopin interpreter.

Moderns we must have and the second part had Tango Americaine, by Carpenter; Sighs from the Maiden and the Nightingale, Granados, and March Wind, Alkan-McDowell, and for encore, Liszt's Etude and a short Rachmaninoff number, closing a most notable program.

The need for better preparatory schools in this section has been in Mr. Burton's mind for some time. So while investigating other proposals he has been spending the winter in Southern Pines with his wife and family. While here he has been convinced of the need and great possibilities offered in North Carolina and of the thoroughness and excellence of the foundational work already accomplished by the Trustees of the North Carolina Preparatory School project. The trustees are pleased that his services are immediately available to assist in planning the building and equipment, selection of teachers and staff, making up the budget of construction and administration and other matters of vital importance in connection with the opening and operation of the institution. They see the possibility right from the start to bring into working out their plans the approved and most up-to-date principles and methods in use in the best preparatory schools in America.

Experienced Education
Mr. Burton was for seven years at the Lawrence School, I. I. N. Y., one of the famous Buckley Schools, where he rose to the position of Senior Master, and was then sent to France to reorganize and Americanize a school for American boys in Paris. On his return from this mission he was for five years Headmaster of Staten Island Academy, New York City and then for five years Headmaster of Brunswick School at Greenwich, Conn. At the later place he won distinction for his vigorous ability and strong leadership in lifting that institution from a condition of despair to one of usefulness and permanent growth.

Mr. Burton is of English parentage and was born in Illinois, but has spent most of his adult life in and around New York. His personal interest in and connection with North Carolina is through marriage to Miss Edna Coble of Guilford College who belongs to a well known family of this state.

Following the announcement of Mr. Burton's appointment on February 15th the Charlotte Committee of Trustees consisting of Frank O. Sherrill, Dr. Henry L. Sloan and Dr. Owen Moore have undertaken measures to accelerate the progress of the campaign for funds now being raised for building purposes in order to open the school at the earliest possible date. Others present at the meeting were Francis M. Osborne, Executive Secretary of the Board; Dr. Thaddeus A. Cheatham of Pinehurst; Struthers Burt and Dean J. W. Harrelson of the North Carolina State College at Raleigh as well as a group of citizens of Charlotte.
