GRAVELY'S 12 POINT PROGRAM FOR NORTH CAROLINA

- BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION:** Injection into State government of sane methods of business efficiency and economy that characterizes every successful business enterprise.
- SCHOOLS:** Further advance of schools, with broadened opportunities for vocational education. Increase in teachers' salaries as revenues of State will permit.
- HEALTH PROTECTION:** "The whole structure of happiness and prosperity rests upon the foundation of the health of our people, and its government owes the obligation to afford all of our people . . . the fullest opportunity for health protection."
- CARE FOR MENTALLY SICK:** Adequate hospital facilities for treatment of those suffering from mental disease.
- ROADS:** No diversion of highway funds. When the surplus is sufficient, reduction should be made in tax on gasoline or license tags. More emphasis on farm-to-market roads.
- STATE ADVERTISING:** Program should be continued as a "worthwhile investment," bringing more taxable value to our State.
- PRISONS:** Modernization of prison system and classification of criminals according to seriousness of their crimes.
- LABOR:** "The happy employment of its people is of vital concern to the State, and the right to work for fair wages in healthful environment must always be maintained."
- TAXES:** No increase. Continued opposition to sales tax, with promise to fight for immediate reduction to 2 per cent.
- AGRICULTURE:** Cooperation with farm programs and diversification of crops. Research to find new uses for agricultural products. Improved marketing facilities.
- PENSIONS:** Old-age retirement for teachers as well as all other State employes.
- SOCIAL SECURITY:** Continuation of Social Security program.

Senator Gravely's Legislative Record

(Served four terms, heading Committee on Appropriations for two years)

- 1929: Introduced a bill creating the North Carolina Highway Patrol.
- 1931: Introduced a bill to prohibit the employment of children under 16 years of age. Offered bill creating State Department of Labor as it is today. Another Gravely bill established the Division of Purchases and Contract, saving the State hundreds of thousands of dollars through centralized buying. Continued movement for shorter work week by introducing bill establishing 55-hour week.
- 1935: Championed a bill providing a rental system for textbooks, thereby greatly reducing costs to parents. A step toward ultimate free textbooks in North Carolina. Led fight for Western North Carolina Tubercular Sanatorium. As chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee, he provided for increased school appropriations, making possible a 20 per cent increase in teachers' salaries the first year of the biennium and 25 per cent the second year. Supported Vocational Education by sponsoring increased appropriations for that purpose.
- 1937: Sponsored legislation to provide unemployment compensation and assistance to aged persons and dependent children. Introduced bill to provide for systematic advertising of State's resources and advantages.

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Elections of Moore County, North Carolina, in regular meeting on the 23 day of March, 1940, ordered a full new registration of voters in Moore County, and pursuant to said order and as by law provided, notice is hereby given that the registration books of Moore County will be open at the usual places in Moore County for a period beginning on the 27th day of April, 1940, and ending on the 11th day of May, 1940, and that during said time all persons who are otherwise qualified and who expect to vote in the primary to be held on May 25, 1940, are required to cause themselves to be duly registered by the Registrar of their respective voting precinct.

Notice is further given that the Spies Precinct voting place will hereafter, be at the Community Building instead of the Public School Building

Notice is further given that the Precinct line between Spencerville and Hemp, by order of the Board of Elections, has been altered and changed so that the said line hereafter will be as follows: Beginning at Howard's Mill Bridge on Deep River running thence along Howard's Mill Bridge Road to Curtis Garner's Filling Station on Highway No. 705, running thence in a straight line toward Haywood Morgan's place to the Spies Precinct Line, thence with the Spies Precinct line to the line of the Westmoore School District line; thence with said line to the beginning, not including the Spies Voting Precinct.

This alteration has the affect of adding more territory to the Spencerville Precinct. And all persons within the boundary aforesaid are required to register and vote in the Spencerville Precinct. The voting place in said precinct hereafter, by order of the Board of Elections, will be held and conducted at the Westmoore School Building.
