Carolina-Virginia Ayrshire Association to Award Prizes to Winners of Competition

An Ayrshire Cattle judging contest will take place in Pinehurst on April 26th at 10 o'clock, in the ring west of the Carolina hotel. Three boys each from the Agricultural Vocational schools of Cameron, Eureka, Raeford, Vass, Carthage and Lakeview will compete for a cup being offered by the Carolina - Virginia Ayrshire Breeders' Association.
