County Board of Education To Ask State for School for Bensalem

At a recent meeting of the County Board of Education held in the office of the County Superintendent with Superintendent H. Lee Thomas, Chairman J. W. Graham of Aberdeen, W. E. Kelly of Carthage, Dr. J. F. Davis of Hemp and J. F. Taylor of Pinehurst in attendance, school committeemen for various districts were appointed.

For Hemp, Dr. W. N. McDuffie was reappointed for a 3-year term and E. M. Ritter was appointed for three years, succeeding E. A. Dunlap. D. D. McCrimmon was appointed to fill out the unexpired term of G. C. Boone, resigned.

For Farm Life, Walter McCaskill and J. R. Guin were reappointed for three years.

Holt McKenzie, Pinehurst, was appointed for three years.

For West End, Jesse W. Page and J. P. Richardson were appointed for three years.

For High Falls, W. E. Woody and George Purvis were reappointed for three years.

On account of the absence of L. B. McKeithen of Cameron, appointment of committeemen for Cameron and Vass-Lakeview was postponed. The Board authorized and directed

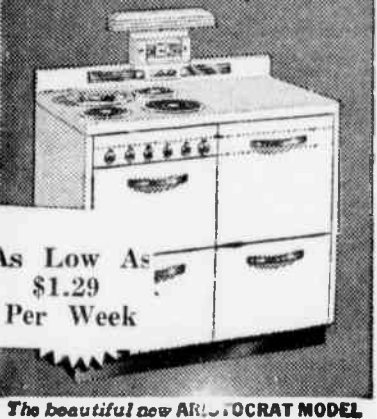

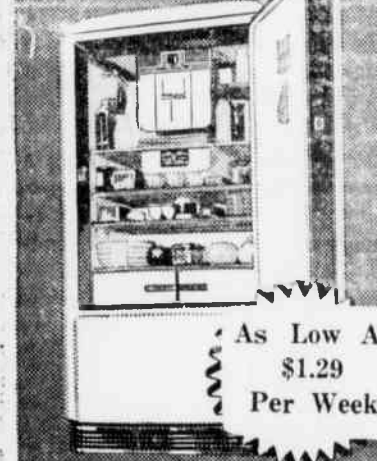
