

**Nearly \$12,000 in Food, Clothing, Distributed**

**W. P. A. Commodity Project Active in Relief Work in Moore County**

One of the interesting WPA activities being carried on in Moore county is the Commodity Distribution Project, which during last year distributed 90,568 pounds of food valued at \$5,228.83; 4,794 garments with estimated value of \$6,513.60, and 24 mattresses valued at \$74.50.

The district warehouse which serves this county is located at Charlotte. This warehouse receives from the Federal Surplus Commodity Corporation carload shipments of surplus farm products purchased by the corporation in an effort to stabilize markets for such products.

Such commodities as are received in bulk are repackaged and the total of all commodities distributed to the various county storerooms, where they are in turn distributed to such relief clients, school lunch rooms, institutions and organizations as may have been certified by the county welfare superintendents as eligible to receive such aid. Distribution is effected semi-monthly.

During the year 1939 the following commodities were given out through the Moore county store-room, the figures in each instance indicating the number of pounds:

Fresh apples, 11,680; pea beans, 2,135; tub butter, 4,627; wheat cereal, 2,096; graham flour 5,648; wheat flour, 25,501; fresh grapefruit, 10,000; corn meal, 8,920; dry skim milk, 855; evaporated milk, 1,793; rolled oats, 844; fresh oranges, 1,115; canned peaches, 954; sweet potatoes, 10,040; seedless raisins, 1,225; milled rice, 1,231.

The commodity headquarters receives from the various county sewing centers of the WPA such clothing and household articles as may be manufactured by them, sends them to the district warehouse where they are inspected, classified and divided for delivery to the various county storerooms, where they are then distributed to such needy persons as the county welfare superintendents certify.

**Nine Nurses Graduate At State Sanatorium**

**Rev. S. A. Maxwell of Aberdeen To Address Class at Exercises Tonight**

The commencement exercises began on Sunday evening with a baccalaureate sermon at the Pinehurst Community Church by the pastor, the Rev. A. J. McKelway. The church choir sang a special number and Master William Viall played several selections on the organ.

**Record Number of 214 Graduated From High Schools of County**

**Eight Schools Report Successful Year.—Complete List of Graduates**

Moore county schools have just closed a successful year's work with 214 girls and boys receiving diplomas from the eight high schools in the county system, the largest number that these schools have ever graduated in a single year.

Carthage High School, of which E. E. Beasley is principal, led with 41; West End, J. F. Sinclair, principal, was second with 36 and Hemp, E. A. West principal ran a close third with 35.

Cameron, R. F. Lowry, principal, graduated 28; Aberdeen, L. J. Dawkins, principal, 22, and Vass-Lakeview, W. V. Nix, principal 20.

Sandhill Farm Life School, of which W. L. Kiser is principal, had 18 graduates and High Falls, E. C. Brady, principal, presented diplomas to 14.

Considerably more than half of this number were girls, there being more girls than boys in every one of the graduating classes.

Moore county schools of today have a greater appeal for the older youth than ever before due to the fact that they offer more in the way of vocational training than in former days.

**Vocational Courses**

Carthage High School offers commercial, home economics and agricultural courses in addition to the regular course of study. Hemp and West End have commercial and home economics courses; Cameron offers home economics and agriculture; Farm Life, Aberdeen and High Falls teach home economics, and Vass-Lakeview has a vocational agriculture department.

The new Westmore school building in upper Moore county will be ready for occupancy with the opening of school in the fall, and it is hoped to have a new building at Farm Life ready for the spring term.

**Pinehurst Man Found Guilty of Attack on Von Boskerck, Fined \$25.00**
