The Weather May Cooler and Drier Than Normal. High Temperature Was 98 Degrees

May was cooler and drier than is normal for this month though the lowest temperature for the month, 41 degrees recorded on the 3rd, was four degrees higher than the surprisingly low of 37 degrees recorded last May.

Eighteen days of the month were all clear, eight days partly cloudy, four days cloudy. Six days had more or less rain, the heaviest shower, that of the 27th, precipitating 1.72 inches. The total fall for the month was 3.59 inches, slightly less than normal for the month, increasing the deficiency for the first five months of the year to nearly four inches.

Five days recorded temperatures of 90 or above, 98 degrees on the 18th, 97 degrees on the 8th. The Raleigh weather observer reported a temperature of 96.2 for the 8th "the hottest May 8th in the annals of his office." Lowest temperature for the month, 41 degrees on the 3rd. Maximum temperature for the month was 13.0 less than normal, minimum temperature 11.6 degrees less than normal; average temperature 4.3 degrees less, not quite approaching the 5.4 degree drop on May, 1931.
