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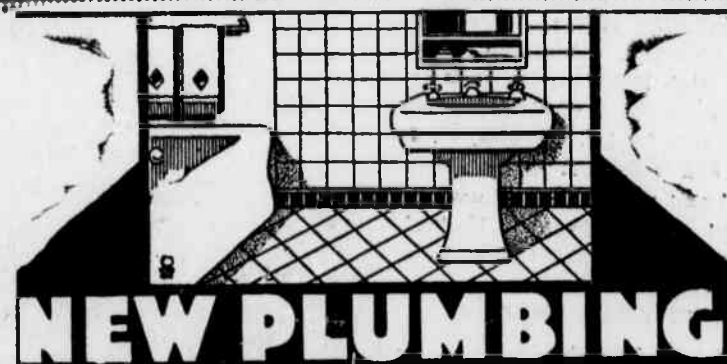


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## Miss Ruth Cameron Bride of Washington Reed at Local Club
