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## A YEAR FOR NON-PARTISANSHIP

The Moore County News reported last week that Democrats around Carthage were scoffing at the claim of the Southern Pines Willkie-for-President Club that it was non-partisan. These Democrats claimed there isn't a Democrat on the membership rolls.

The Pilot does not know the names of the members of the local Willkie club, whether it comprises solely Republicans or not. But it does not think the point of the Carthage Democrats is well taken. If there was ever a non-partisan political campaign, this year's is it, regardless of Roosevelt clubs or Willkie clubs. If there was ever a year when party lines are to be crossed, it is 1940.

There are scores of Democrats in Moore county who are going to vote for Mr. Willkie, whether or not they are members of a club bearing his name. The Pilot knows of men who have been prominent in the Democratic party for years who are supporting Mr. Willkie. Why? Because they are men of independent minds. Some are unalterably opposed to a third term. They have seen what eight years have brought about in federal control of our institutions, in interference with business. They fear for a continuance of policies which lead in the direction of dictatorship. Others are favorable to Mr. Willkie as a man who has come up from the masses, fighting his way from the bottom to the top, to the successful management of a great industry. They see in him the man America needs at this time. He is no experiment; he has proven himself, in every endeavor.

On the other hand, there are scores of Democrats in this county who, though feeling as do the others, will vote the straight Democratic ticket solely because it is the Democratic ticket. Because of the complexion of the two tickets this year, this does not seem sensible. If they think Mr. Roosevelt the better man to govern the country at this time all well and good. But if they lean toward Mr. Willkie, it would seem as if they could conscientiously follow the footsteps of practically every former Democratic National Chairman, former Democratic Presidential candidates and other leaders of their party in supporting him.

It's no year for Party; it's Country this time.
